<b>American Academy of Arts &amp; Sciences</b>	<a href="#">Visiting Scholars Program</a>	10/22/13	The Visiting Scholars Program is designed to stimulate and support research conducted by younger public policy analysts, humanists, and social scientists who show promise of becoming leaders in their field, especially those who work on multidisciplinary topics. The Program offers opportunities for them to carry out their individual research as well as to collaborate with Academy Fellows on shared scholarly or policy-related interests.

<b>American Council of Learned Societies</b>	<a href="#">Charles A. Ryskamp Research Fellowships</a>	9/26/13	These fellowships support advanced assistant professors and untenured associate professors in the humanities and related social sciences whose scholarly contributions have advanced their fields and who have well-designed and carefully developed plans for new research. The fellowships are intended to provide time and resources to enable these faculty members to conduct their research under optimal conditions. The ultimate goal of the project should be a major piece of scholarly work by the applicant. The sponsor does not fund creative work (e.g., novels or films), textbooks, straightforward translation, or pedagogical projects.
<b>American Council of Learned Societies</b>	<a href="#">Collaborative Research Fellowships</a>	9/26/13	These awards support collaborative research in the humanities and related social sciences. The aim of this fellowship program is to offer small teams of two or more scholars the opportunity to collaborate intensively on a single, substantive project. The fellowship supports projects that aim to produce a tangible research product (such as joint print or web publications) for which two or more collaborators will take credit.

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American Council of Learned Societies	<a href="#">Digital Innovation Fellowships</a>	9/26/13	Supports digitally based research projects in all disciplines of the humanities and humanities-related social sciences. This year's successful applicants may take up the fellowship in 2014-2015 or at any time up to September 1, 2015, with tenure completed by June 30, 2016. Fellowship tenure may be one continuous year, or two semesters taken over two years, but candidates must commit themselves firmly to their preferred timeframe on their completed applications.
American Council of Learned Societies	<a href="#">Fellowships</a>	9/26/13	Invites research applications in all disciplines of the humanities and humanities-related social sciences. The Fellowships are intended as salary replacement to help scholars devote six to twelve continuous months to full-time research and writing. An ACLS Fellowship may be held concurrently with other fellowships and grants and any sabbatical pay, up to an amount equal to the candidate's current academic year salary. Tenure of the fellowship may begin no earlier than July 1, 2012 and no later than February 1, 2013. The ultimate goal of the project should be a major piece of scholarly work by the applicant. ACLS does not fund creative work (e.g., novels or films), textbooks, straightforward translation, or pedagogical projects.
American Council of Learned Societies	<a href="#">Frederick Burkhardt Residential Fellowships for Recently Tenured Scholars</a>	9/26/13	These fellowships support long-term, unusually ambitious projects in the humanities and related social sciences. Burkhardt Fellowships are intended to support an academic year (normally nine months) of residence at any one of the national residential research centers participating in the program. Such an environment, beyond providing free time, encourages exchanges across disciplinary lines that can be especially helpful to deepening and expanding the significance of projects in the humanities and related social sciences. Candidates must also commit themselves to relocating as needed in order to be in residence for the tenure of the fellowship. The ultimate goal of the project should be a major piece of scholarly work by the applicant.
American Institute for Yemeni Studies	<a href="#">Programs and Fellowships</a>	Varies; fellowship deadline: 12/31/13	The American Institute for Yemeni Studies annually holds two competitions for fellowship programs supporting research on Yemen, one for U.S. citizens, presently limited to venues other than Yemen, and one for citizens of the Republic of Yemen. Both are funded by grants from the State Department's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs.
American Philosophical Society	<a href="#">Fellowships and Grants</a>	Varies by fellowship	Since 1933 the American Philosophical Society has awarded research grants to more than 15,000 scholars and encourages all eligible current candidates to apply for our grants and fellowships. We continuously review our application forms and submission procedures to make them as simple and as clear as possible, but we do require that applicants and referees use these forms and procedures.

<b>American Psychology Association</b>	<a href="#">Congressional Fellowship Program</a>	1/11/13	Provide psychologists with an invaluable public policy learning experience, to contribute to the more effective use of psychological knowledge in government and to broaden awareness about the value of psychology-government interaction among psychologists and within the federal government. Fellows spend one year working on the staff of a member of Congress or congressional committee. Activities may involve drafting legislation, conducting oversight work, assisting with congressional hearings and events, and preparing briefs and speeches. Fellows also attend a two week orientation program on congressional and executive branch operations, which includes guidance in the congressional placement process, and participate in a year-long seminar series on science and public policy issues. The American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) administers these aspects of the program for the APA Fellows and for fellows sponsored by over two dozen other professional societies.

East-West Center	<a href="#">POSCO Visiting Fellowship Program</a>	12/31	The East-West Center proposes to invite four to six visiting fellows who will spend one or two months each carrying out policy-related research on issues regarding Northeast Asia that are of common concern -- such as globalization, economic regionalism, economic restructuring, political change, and the changing East Asian security environment, including the Korean Peninsula. The POSCO Fellowship Program is intended to generate constructive and informative research on four important issues: (1) issues concerning the two Koreas and Northeast Asia; (2) security issues for Korea and Northeast Asia; economic and social aspects of Korea-related issues; (4) political aspects of Korea-related issues. POSCO visiting fellows are in residence at the East-West Center and are provided with a stipend and round trip economy airfare to Honolulu. They are intended to support scholars in the production of substantial works on the foreign policy of the Kennedy years, especially with regard to the western hemisphere, or on Kennedy domestic policy, especially with regard to racial justice and to the conservation of natural resources.
